(c) This is appropriate because Catullus is speaking as Appius the Blind, who ~~is~~ is a dead ancestor to Clodia.

2. They asked her to be ~~domestica~~ <sup>mistress of the home</sup> and to bring "laudes in gloria muliebri" or praise in the glory of women to their family.

3. Synchysis or inter-locked word order: ~~quae~~ ~~patrem~~ ~~complexa~~ ~~triumphantem~~, where <sup>complexa</sup> ~~quae~~ modifies ~~triumphantem~~ and ~~triumphantem~~ modifies ~~patrem~~.

4. (a) The Vestal Virgin Claudia helped her father during a triumphal procession.

(b) She would not allow her father to be "~~ab~~ ab inimico tribuno plebei de curru trahi" or dragged away from the chariot by the enemy tribune of the people.

(c) To help ~~the~~ her father, Claudia embraced him.

1a. ~~Quintus~~ Appius Claudius

b. *nostrae imagines viriles* refers to all of the images Cicero called upon of people's ancestors that represented noble, honorable people, including Caecus Appius Claudius builder of the Appian Way and ancestor to Clodia.

c. it is appropriate for the speaker to refer to this custom because the jury was made up of the "eques" or the equestrian class. They came from rich, powerful families and they were all men. Calling upon famous ancestors is something the jurors could relate to. Also, in this passage Cicero is attacking a woman who the jurors saw as morally bankrupt.

2. "*aemulam domesticae laudis in gloria muliebri esse admonebat.*"

The female members of the Claudian family advise Lesbia to be a woman who brings praise and glory to the family name.

3. *homeoteluton "patrem...triumphantem"*

4a. The vestal Virgin saved her father's life

b. She wanted to prevent her father from being dragged out of a chariot by angry Plebians, "*quae patrem complexa triumphantem ab inimico tribuno plebei de urru detrakti passa non est?*"
